### VI. Video: WHAT IS Justice (Harris)

Mostly when we think about justice, we think about what is fair. We think about people getting what they deserve. We talk about justice when someone does something wrong and they get a punishment.

Of course, when we are the ones who did something wrong, we might have a different idea of what justice looks like than when someone else does something wrong. In the Bible, Jesus talks about justice being much more than crimes and punishments. In fact, he even challenges the ideas of the day about what is fair. Before Jesus, justice usually meant that whatever someone did should be done back to them. It was called "an eye for an eye."

Then Jesus came along and talked about mercy. He talked about forgiveness. He talked about compassion. He talked about humility. He said it was really possible for God to transform someone's life. He said that God could free people from their selfishness and tear down the towers people built to protect their own sin. He believed it so much that he was willing to die for it. And so, justice started to mean something more.

That makes justice so important. When we follow Jesus, justice is about treating all people like human beings who are loved by God and who deserve to be treated with dignity. Justice is about working together for a transformed world. Justice is about lining ourselves up with God's way of doing things and standing up for what is right instead of what is comfortable or easy.

God, give me the courage to act with justice. Amen.
