## **EPIPHANY**

Scripture: Matthew 2:1-15 & Exodus 1:8-2:10

Character Spotlight: Joseph

#### THEOLOGICAL SUMMARY

Epiphany unveils divine presence in unexpected places and people, revealing that true revelation demands resistance. In Matthew's telling, revelation is not peaceful or benign but dangerous and urgent. The visit of the magi—foreign astrologers seeking a new king—marks the beginning of public recognition of Jesus' identity. But their arrival also alerts King Herod, whose power is threatened by the very idea of another kind of ruler. The magi's decision to listen to divine warnings and resist Herod's manipulation places them among the first resisters of empire in Jesus' story.

Joseph listens, too. Throughout the first two chapters of Matthew's gospel, Joseph is a model of faithful responsiveness to divine guidance. He listens to messages given in dreams and acts without hesitation to protect what is vulnerable. He leads his family on a journey of forced migration, fleeing to Egypt under the cover of night. His faithfulness is not abstract; it is embodied through action, disruption, and care. By attending to Joseph's resistance and the magi's defiance, Epiphany becomes a story not just of recognition, but of radical courage in the face of imperial violence.

These themes echo the Exodus story, where the survival of Moses required midwives, mothers, and daughters to resist Pharaoh's genocidal orders. In both Matthew and Exodus, divine presence is made known through the actions of those who refuse to comply with death-dealing systems. Herod and Pharaoh both seek to protect their power by targeting the most vulnerable—children. Yet in both stories, it is those without seats of power who become agents of salvation. Revelation is not located in the center of empire but in fugitives, dreams, and acts of radical care.

As we annually celebrate Epiphany on January 6, we must reclaim it from the shadow cast by the U.S. Capitol insurrection of January 6. The date has been marked

by violence, white Christian nationalism, and empirepreserving rage. But Epiphany, rightly understood, invites us to name and resist these distortions. The message of Christ does not bless empire; it exposes and confronts it. In a world where ICE functions as a domestic army, tearing families apart and incarcerating migrants, where genocide unfolds before our eyes in Gaza, and where children continue to suffer under the weight of power's greed, Epiphany's call is urgent.

This is not a sentimental season. It is an invitation to see, to name where God is revealed, and to align ourselves accordingly. In dreams, in stars, and in unexpected arrivals, divine presence appears—and those who perceive it are invited into the work of protection, protest, and prophetic imagination.



#### CHARACTER SPOTLIGHT

Joseph, so often portrayed as silent and secondary, emerges in Matthew's gospel as a model of holy courage. He does not speak a word in this scripture, yet his actions speak volumes. He listens. Not once, but multiple times, Joseph receives divine messages in dreams and responds with immediate trust. He protects Mary and Jesus not through violence or dominance, but by disrupting expectations, relocating his family, and resisting compliance with Herod's regime.
