

FIRST SUNDAY AFTER CHRISTMAS

Scripture: Luke 2:22-40 & Psalm 148 Character Spotlight: Anna

THEOLOGICAL SUMMARY

This week's text offers no miracles, no angels, no crowds. Instead, we see a quiet, sacred unveiling—an infant brought to the temple by faithful parents, met by two elders whose wisdom and devotion allow them to recognize what others might miss. Anna's story reminds us that faithfulness is often slow, persistent, and rooted in daily presence. Her authority doesn't come from spectacle or visibility, but from decades of prayer, praise, and showing up. She blesses with her life and her voice.

In a society that often devalues aging and sidelines women, Anna's witness disrupts the myth that worth is tied to productivity or youth. Her story names what's wrong—that long love and quiet devotion are too often overlooked—and imagines better: a kin(g)dom where faith is honored not with position but with presence. We lament the loneliness of waiting and being unseen. But Anna teaches us how to live it out: by recognizing what is holy, naming what is true, and proclaiming joy even after a long silence.



CHARACTER SPOTLIGHT

Anna's name means "grace," and her life is grace in motion. Described as devout and present day after day in the temple, Anna is not remembered for dramatic acts or public miracles, but for her recognition. Her long years of worship, prayer, and fasting form the foundation of a holy attentiveness. She sees what others miss: that this ordinary-looking baby is the beginning of something extraordinary. Her ability to recognize God at work is her gift—and her voice rises to share it.

While Simeon speaks to the parents, Anna speaks to everyone who waits and longs for redemption. She doesn't just keep her recognition private—she announces it with joy. Anna's presence is her proclamation. In a culture that often ignores elders, dismisses women, and values usefulness over devotion, Anna becomes a witness not in spite of her age, but because of it. She teaches us that recognizing what is sacred, especially after long waiting, is a holy act. And when we see clearly—like Anna—we must speak.

First Sunday after Christmas: Lighting the Candles

Person A: Jesus is born! us!

All: Emmanuel! God is with

<u>Person B:</u> Today, we light the four Advent candles...that we might be reminded to have vigilant hope, bring prophetic peace, being open to unexpected joy, sharing merciful love

(Light the four candles...for hope, peace, joy, and love)

<u>Person A:</u> So, what is different? For Mary and Joseph, everything changed. They were parents now, tasked with caring for a fragile infant. We weren't witnesses to the actual birth; rather, we are celebrating a memorial of a momentous event. We live on this side of the crucifixion and resurrection, and through the Holy Spirit, God is with us every day. So, what is different?

<u>Person A:</u> With the new year upon us, take a moment and name injustices, difficulties, and systemic changes that harm our community and world.

(pause for people to name these out loud, in their hearts, and in the online chat)

<u>Person A:</u> Naming what is wrong is a sacred task of the church known as lament. We can't work toward making things right if we don't understand and name what is wrong.

Light the Christ candle.

<u>Person B:</u> Struggles, however, are not the only reality. We light the Christ Candle as a reminder of the promise of blessings that are also present and deserve attention. Like the candles, blessings brighten when lighted and displayed for all to see. As we approach a new year, we will now share out loud some blessings that have taken place over the past year and ones we anticipate for the coming year.

(pause for people to name these out loud, in their hearts, and in the online chat)

All: Emmanuel, God-with-us, thank you for giving us your will to dream, and giving us the strength to go forward, living out your blessings for generations!
